

## At A Glance: Girl Scout Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards

GRADE	Girls must be in 4 <sup>th</sup> or 5 <sup>th</sup> grade and a registered Girl Scout Junior.	Girls must be in 6 <sup>th</sup> , 7 <sup>th</sup> or 8 <sup>th</sup> grade and a registered Girl Scout Cadette	Girls must be in 9 <sup>th</sup> , 10 <sup>th</sup> , 11 <sup>th</sup> or 12 <sup>th</sup> grade and a registered Girl Scout Senior or Ambassador
OVERVIEW	Be part of a team where girls take the lead and a troop leader or group volunteer provides help and guidance  Suggested hours are 20 or more for EACH girl  Council approval needed for any money earning	Complete a Cadette Journey  Work as an individual or in a small group (2-4) where girls take the lead and a troop leader or group volunteer provides help and guidance  Suggested hours are 50 or more for EACH girl  Council approval needed for any money earning	Complete two Journeys (Senior or Ambassador) OR earn the Silver Award and one Senior or Ambassador Journey  Individually girl led with a Project Advisor (can't be a family member or troop leader) that provides expertise and guidance  Suggested hours are 80 or more  Council approval needed for any money earning
TAKE ACTION PROJECT	Group Take Action Project focuses on something the girls care about that they would like to improve within their community. Puts the Promise and Law into action.	Individual or group Take Action Project makes the neighborhood or community better and looks to partner with a community group/organization. Puts the Promise and Law into action.	Individual Take Action project that makes a lasting difference in the local community, region or beyond. Puts the Promise and Law into action.
SUSTAINABLE	After the project is complete, girls develop an understanding of sustainability by talking together about how solutions can be lasting.	Girls demonstrate an understanding of sustainability in the project plan and implementation.	Take Action project includes provisions to ensure sustainability.
GLOBAL	After the project is complete, girls develop an understanding of the wider world by talking together about how others may experience the same problem that their project helped resolve.	Girls connect with others outside their immediate community, learn how others have solved similar problems and determine if the ideas of others can help with their plan.	Identify national and/or global links to their selected issue. They learn from others and develop a plan to share the results of their project beyond the local community.
