





Name of Knot	When to use it	Directions
<b>Overhand</b>	When only a simple knot is needed.	
<b>Square</b>	To join two ropes of equal thickness.	
<b>Sheetbend</b>	To join two ropes of different thickness.	
<b>Clove Hitch</b>	To fasten one end of a rope to a tree or post. Use this knot to tie a clothesline.	
<b>Bowline</b>	To make a loop that won't slip. Loop remains the same size you make it. Use this loop to tie a boat to a dock.	
<b>Taut-line Hitch</b>	To make a loop that will slip. Use this knot on tent lines.	
<b>Lark's Head</b>	To loop around a ring. Use this knot for hanging dunk bags.
